




* What's Your Shoe Size?



Here is another one--4% of the world's children under the age of 14 live in the United States, but account for 37% of all toy sales worldwide. It is pretty obvious that some people have a much greater impact on the world's resources and ultimately a greater effect on the carrying capacity of the earth.

The average person in the world today has a footprint of 6 global acres. If we divide the number of people by the total acres available, it would mean that there are only 4.05 global acres per person. 




