


What is a refugee?

In order to "walk in their shoes," you should know something about the following terms used to describe people who seek refuge:

- A refugee is a person who leaves his or her country because of a well-founded fear of persecution for reasons of race, religion, nationality, membership in a particular group, or political opinion.
- An asylum-seeker is a person seeking refuge (safety) from the previously mentioned threats. International law recognizes the right to seek asylum, but it does not obligate countries to provide it.
- Internally displaced persons (IDP's) are people who have been forced from their under the jurisdiction, or authority, of the governments that might not were internation persecution.

You'll be using these terms in your final report, so be sure to take notes!

Why should Americans care about refugees?


- Many refugees share our values. Often, they are fleeing punishment for participating in pro-democracy movements or for speaking out against government repression and corruption. Others are persecuted because of their religion, ethnicity, or social group.
- The United States is part of a global effort. If the U.S. withdraws from helping to resettle refugees, other nations, including those "first-asylum" countries, might decide that they, too, can no longer afford to help.
- Refusing refugees can encourage illegal immigrants. Fair refugee and asylum policies are essential to immigration reform. By denying people in danger a legal route to safety, we only encourage them to enter the U.S. illegally. It is in our self-interest to smooth their transition into society and help them find productive work.
- Refugees are human beings and are therefore entitled to the human rights laid out in the UDHR. If we do not support the rights of others, how can we expect to receive our own? Remember: with rights come responsibilities.
