

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



#### Before proceeding, you will need to contact your instructor to get the name of your assigned country.

You will act as a Non-Governmental Organization (NGO) and make a case against the country assigned to you for the violation of human rights. You should research the NGO country reports from the <u>Amnesty International</u> and/or the <u>Human Rights Watch</u> web sites. This will be important to arguing your case if the country has signed the documents. Your case should include the following:

- The name of the country.
- · At least three specific examples of human rights violations that occurred in the country.
- An explanation of which articles of the UDHR are/were being violated. You may also include information about other articles of human rights documents that are being violated, such as the Convention on the Rights of the Child or the Convention Against Torture. This information would bolster your case.
- Which, if any, human rights documents the country has signed. You can find this information at the <u>UNHCHR</u> web site where the documents are listed by country.
- The action or actions that you would like for the United Nations Human Rights Committee to take.


